#### BLUEBIRD MONITORING AT ANDY GUEST SHENANDOAH RIVER STATE PARK.

Our bluebird trail here is 50 boxes with 20 more going up in the next two weeks. The trail is split into sections that take about 2 hours to monitor. ## Support Land and Water Conservation Fund

Since 1964, the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) has helped protect birds and their habitat by conserving parks, places for outdoor recreation, and areas of cultural significance in every state. The program has historically been bipartisan because it is funded through the sale of offshore oil and gas leases, which means that it comes at no additional cost to the taxpayer. Over the years, the funds have been used to protect national parks, forests, wildlife refuges, and battlefields while simultaneously providing grants for state and local parks and recreation areas.

LWCF has had a tremendously positive impact in Virginia. The state has received approximately \$340 million in funding over the past four decades to protect sites like Manassas National Battlefield Park, Shenandoah National Park, and Wolf Trap National Park for the Performing Arts. LWCF has made it possible to walk the Appalachian Trail end-to-end by providing the funding necessary to improve access to hikers throughout the entire stretch. LWCF has also provided the funds for improvements to local, county, regional, and state parks across Northern Virginia.

Unfortunately, LWCF is set to expire at the end of September if no action is taken by Congress to renew the program. There are already bills circulating in the US House and Senate that would permanently renew the program. In the House, over 215 Members have already added their name to the legislation, including a record number of Republicans. Congresswoman Barbara Comstock has publicly expressed her support for LWCF in the past, but has yet to cosponsor this important bill. She wants to hear from her constituents why they feel this program is important and why she should add her name.

Thanks to LWCF, every year we see the expansion of our network of protected land, improvement in our access to outdoor recreation, and more places for birds protected from development. As a constituent, you have a story to tell as to why parks and other public lands are important, and why a conservation program like LWCF deserves to be protected. Share your story with Congresswoman Comstock by calling her office, writing a letter, or taking action at audubon.org/take action and urge her to support permanently renewal of the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Bring binoculars if you have them, and your alert eyes and ears! Upcoming Saturday morning walk dates are: March 17, March 31, April 14, and April 28. All walks begin in the parking lot in front of Children of America at 631 W Jubal Early Drive in Winchester. The walks start at 8:30 AM and usually wrap up around 10:30

## NORTHERN SHENANDOAH VALLEY AUDUBON ARBORETUM

Audubon Arboretum, within Jim Barnett Park in Winchester, Virginia began in 1999 and 2000 with an agreement between the Winchester Parks and Recreation Department (WPRD), and the Northern Shenandoah Valley Audubon Society (NSVAS), to establish and maintain a portion of park property along Pleasant Valley Road for the expressed purpose of protecting a green area that would be a peaceful location where people could appreciate and reflect on nature in general and specifically learn about trees, plants, and shrubs. Today, almost 20 years later and with help from many individuals and businesses, we have over 100 trees planted representing more than 40 species. Our earliest plantings have grown to become beautiful specimens. The 2 Bald Cypress are nearly 30 feet tall. The Red Maple, donated in memory of past Audubon members, has survived severe drought, freezing temperatures, and even some hurricanes. And the Tulip Trees are excellent representations of not only beauty but also of important natural resources. The Oaks are producing acorns, the Crab Apple, Cherries, and Viburnum, when in bloom, add to the Spring flowering, and the Hollies, White Pine, and Arborvitae give us color all year long. All of these trees and plantings quietly contribute to our community in many often forgotten ways.

Currently, NSVAS and WPRD are working with the Winchester Host Lions Club to develop a sensory trail within the Arboretum where tree descriptions will be in braille. And, a Pollination Garden will be planted soon that will add color, assist our insect friends in the important work they do, and provide opportunities for education and learning.

#### DIRECTIONS FOR PARKING FOR OUR PROGRAM MEETINGS

From Millwood Ave., take University Drive around curve and pass Armstrong Hall. Turn right onto L.P. Hill Drive, then right again onto Wade Miller Drive. There are 3 parking lots on the right, the first and second ones (Lot G and J) are closer to Henkel Hall, which houses Hester Auditorium.

### Buy a Bluebird Box

Looking for the perfect gift for a fellow nature lover? These bluebird boxes are the answer! Built with TLC by dedicated trail monitor and handyman Chris Lewis, these boxes are the same design as the boxes used on our bluebird trails. Constructed using the safest, most preferred specifications, these boxes will happily accommodate many of our native cavity nesters. They are made of unpainted, untreated 3/4" cedar, have a large overhanging slanted roof for shade and ample protection from the elements, no perch, a 1.5" diameter hole, ventilation, drainage holes, grooves inside the front door to aid fledglings in climbing out, and a side door that opens for cleaning and monitoring. #### TIPS:

- Mount on 8 ft., 3/4" diameter galvanized pipe, with the entrance hole 5 ft. off the ground.
- Install a predator guard to keep snakes, raccoons and other predators from raiding nests.
- Monitor boxes at least once a week to check on progress and control House Sparrows, wasps, etc.

#### Volunteers Needed

Help the bluebirds at Andy Guest Shenandoah River State Park, Bentonville, VA.

You can see an empty bird box one week, a complete nest the next week, and then a clutch of blue eggs the next week. It takes a few more weeks for the eggs to hatch, then watch the nestlings grow feathers, and then they

fledge. Monitors check 25 or more boxes twice a week in the afternoon, on Wednesday and on the weekend, and work in teams of 2 or more. This usually takes 2 hours at the park. If interested contact Roxie Leonard, roxie 822@comcast.net or Lee Bowen, lbowen@ramseytruevalue.com.

#### Virginia's Breeding Birds Thirty Years Later

Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas Project Director

In the mid-1980s, Virginia conducted its first breeding bird atlas (BBA) project to assess the status and distribution of Virginia's breeding birds. This is the third year of the current Virginia BBA project. The resulting data has already provided a revealing look into how breeding bird populations have changed over the last thirty years. State Atlas Coordinator, Dr. Ashley Peele, will highlight some of these changes, share interesting species and discussing important needs for the remaining three years of this project.
